

Heart Work Programme



Taking that first step into the working world and contemplating career choices is tricky for most of us. For CCF's youth survivors, there are added concerns about the suitability of a job, especially if they have long-term health-related issues.

> This year, CCF introduced Survivor's Employment Support to provide relevant services to enhance employment opportunities, employment fit and sustainability for our youths. As part of this pilot initiative, Heart Work Programme, a customised work skills training

foundation programme, was launched. Each year, a group of participants, who face

difficulty securing employment due to their health, will get the opportunity to cultivate an interest in a specific set of work skills.

For its first run, Heart Work Programme will be focusing on art techniques, allowing a group of seven beneficiaries try their hand at being ARTrepreneurs!

Through bi-monthly sessions from April to October 2022, participants get to broaden their craft by working with different mediums and methods – acrylic painting, hand building pottery and creating jesmonite dishware. Equipped with these new skills, our talented youth survivors hope to share their joy and creations with the rest of the world!

ComFur Zone: Comfort and Discomfort

"I was surprised I actually managed to get close to the horse!" exclaimed childhood cancer survivor Fithri.

After embracing new experiences of feeding, petting and taking the horses for a walk, our beneficiaries proceeded with an expressive art session to reflect on their emotions. Every one of them had a great time! We would like to extend our gratitude to HERD Singapore and our volunteer photographer for making the day especially memorable for our beneficiaries.

YouthConnect: Games Day

The air was rife with merriment, and cheering could be heard at CCF's Hangouts on 30 July 2022. 

WELLNESS STUDIO

Wellness Studio is a members-only gym for childhood cancer survivors aged 13 to 35 years old. The studio is equipped with interactive cardio machines and pneumatic gym equipment. Pneumatic machines allow resistance increment in small variations to match differing physical abilities and training goals. They also ensure a safe workout experience for our gym-goers.

To gain access to our Wellness Studio, beneficiaries can sign up as members under CCF's Wellness Membership Programme. This membership provides exclusive access to the Studio and the opportunity to work out with like-minded peers under the guidance of a professional trainer. Wellness members will also be invited to members-only monthly group workouts that are conducted by experienced instructors.





You guessed it right. This is a prime spot for hanging out among our youth beneficiaries.

Vibrantly decorated and filled with video games and table-top games, Hangouts provides a safe, warm and inviting environment for youths to bond with each other. The spacious room also offers some quiet for those wanting to complete their assignments or work.

CCF social workers often hold regular activities for our beneficiaries, ranging from gatherings to workshops on playing table pool and much more!

SibsConnect: Rescuing Neverland!



SibsConnect — an annual programme to strengthen the bonds between children with cancer and their siblings — returned on 25 June 2022 with a magical twist. Loosely inspired by Peter Pan, 19 childhood cancer survivors and their siblings embarked on an adventure through Neverland. Held at National University of Singapore (NUS), Neverland was brought to life with the help of Project Kaleidoscope from NUS Volunteer Action Committee (NVAC).

The participants were informed by Luna, a fairy from Neverland, that her home was in chaos with its inhabitants turning against each other! To restore peace, they participants had to work co-operatively within their sibling units by defeating scary sea monsters and rebuilding the homes of Neverland.

Armed with only a Neverland map, some materials and food, the siblings traversed through unknown lands and met magical creatures beyond their imagination, including mermaids, pirates and the Lost Boys. Through the children's spirited intervention, Neverland could continue to exist and thrive under the care of its now-happy residents.

More importantly, the people of Neverland were reminded of the values needed to face life's difficulties: counting on each other for strength and support; always learning and being open to the wonders of the world; and not shying away from failure. In celebration of successfully completing their adventure, the participants had a ball of a time taking fun Polaroid photos with their siblings at the SibsConnect photo booth. In the spirit of reminding themselves of what is true and important like the residents of Neverland, the children also received handwritten cards from their siblings that conveyed how much they are loved and appreciated for simply being who they are.

SibsConnect may have ended for the year, but the memories created will stick with the children till their next sibling adventure together.

Staying Positive in the Face of Cancer



Little Nigel is a fighter. Just four years old, he has battled cancer head on and come out on top — all while demonstrating a positive spirit that belies his age.

When he was two years old, some swelling around his eyes led to several rounds of tests at the National University Hospital (NUH) which came back negative. By then his symptoms had progressed to include a shoulder ache and bouts of fever. After more tests, that included a painful bone marrow biopsy, Nigel was diagnosed with Acute Myeloid Leukaemia (AML) which was brought on by Myelodysplastic Syndrome (MDS). "It felt like a nightmare. I couldn't accept it," said his mother. "He was still so young and having to watch him go through all these things was just so heartwrenching for me."

Given his age, Nigel did not understand he had cancer. He only knew that he needed to fight the "bad guys" in his body, and it was a tough fight. His treatments included chemotherapy and, due to the high risk of MDS relapsing, little Nigel also had to undergo a stem cell transplant. Throughout his treatment processes, he experienced several side-effects which included having his Hickman line (a central venous catheter) infected, mucositis, diarrhoea, and a bad rash that caused him to scratch his skin raw. The young warrior also had to battle against Graft versus Host Disease (GvHD) after his transplant, which brought about very bad cramps and diarrhoea, rendering him unable to eat anything.

Despite all the discomfort, Nigel never threw a tantrum. Instead, he remained content with staying indoors and accepted the treatment stoically, even being mindful to wear his mask and not touch his port and treatment areas. Supporting him through the process was CCF Child Life Specialist Sarah. By engaging him in therapeutic play with medical toy dolls, she showed him what the Hickman line was used for and helped him to understand the intravenous (IV) installation process. "The sessions allayed his fear about the procedures. He didn't have trouble going for them after that," explained Nigel's mummy.

CCF social worker Zhurong followed up closely with the family to ensure that they were coping well – something that Nigel's mummy is very thankful for. "She helped me so much. She gave me emotional support and shared many tips on how to care for Nigel."

To give Nigel a sense of normalcy, he is now enrolled in Place for Academic Learning and Support (PALS). Amidst a safe and hygienic environment with attentive teachers, he plays with other children his age and receives one-on-one lessons that are customised to his needs. Confident that Nigel is in good hands, his mummy has returned to work.

Having recovered well from his ordeal, the young Transformer fan is ready to take on more battles. "I want to be a Transformer! I want to transform from car mode to robot mode to fight bad guys!"



Enrichment: Magical Milk at CCF@KKH

On 21 April 2022, CCF beneficiaries at CCF@KKH became mini scientists and learned about the perils of pollution. By experimenting with milk, ink color and dishwashing detergent, the children were provided clear examples of how Earth is being contaminated and the repercussions of pollution. Intrigued and informed by the chemical reactions they witnessed, the children understood that we all have a part to play in saving the earth. Refuse, Reduce, Reuse, Recycle!



Entertainment: Baked Pasta at CCF@KKH



CCF@KKH was filled with the warm and comforting aroma of freshly baked pasta on 24 May 2022. The children were thrilled to figuratively don a chef's hat and try their hand at preparing their own baked pasta for lunch. They mixed fusilli with pasta sauce before adding yummy delights such as cheese, sausages, bell peppers, mushrooms and ham. The little ones eagerly waited as their pasta baked in the oven before happily digging into their freshly baked meal, proud of their achievement.

For this year's Mother's Day celebrations, the children at CCF@ KKH and CCF@NUH made customised photo frames instead of the usual flower-making activities. From 4 to 6 May 2022, CCF staff went around with a camera to take photos of the children to place inside the frame. The children were particularly enthusiastic about ensuring the photo frames remained a surprise, with one beneficiary requesting her mother to hide while she completed decorating it.

The children were so eager to present their handmade gifts to their mothers that they had to be reminded to do so on the actual day itself. When finally able to give their mothers their beautifully crafted photo frames, some beneficiaries also shared what they love the most about their mothers, before ending the sharing with a hug and a very heartfelt "I love you, mummy!".

PPD at PALS
